The goals of the program are for students to build self-esteem, to excel in secondary education as well as achieve a post-secondary education, become involved in extracurricular activities and emphasizing the importance of community involvement.

FLA East Bay's Founder

Ruben Rosalez



In 1991 Ruben Rosalez, who participated in the 1982 inaugural conference in Southern California, came back home to Pittsburg, California and established the East Bay Area Affiliate of FLA. Ruben currently works for the United States Federal Department of Labor. Ruben

knows the role that FLA has played in his own success and is now sharing that with others. Ruben is now leading a new group of FLA alumni with the resurrection of FLA East Bay Area. Those trained to lead are now leading.

Level I

The program begins with the six-day entry Level I Leadership conference for 30 to 80 eighth and ninth graders in a camp setting. The 2025 youth leadership conference will be held from June 23, 2025 through June 28, 2025 at Camp Concord in South Lake Tahoe. The conference is designed to motivate students to excel in secondary education through various workshops on various topics, including public speaking, a four-year high school plan, assertiveness, brain storming, college entrance requirements, goal setting for home school, and the community. FLA East Bay builds self-esteem through cultural arts where students receive a historical backdrop and get an introduction to teatro, baile folklorico, murals, poetry and folk singing. The Level I Conference also begins to plant the seeds for leadership with such workshops as What Makes a Leader, parliamentary procedures and community leaders panel where leaders from the community discuss their life experiences and challenges they have overcome. This gives the students an up-close look at role- models that resemble themselves.



Level II

The entry level program is not sufficient to maintain the high levels of confidence the Level I participants have when leaving the Level I Leadership Conference, therefore FLA provides follow-up Level II University Seminars held at California Campuses throughout the academic year. These workshops reinforce their new skills, introduce them to the University of California system, and acquaints them with the function and design of a major university. Some workshops include requirement for admission, financial aid, Equal Opportunity Program, student activities, a university panel of college age Future Leaders who discuss their major, and as well as their experiences and challenges they have faced at the university level. Campus life and additional topics leading to a degree are also explored. FLA graduate students return as trained facilitators, conference leaders and volunteers a means of strengthening and continuing their involvement in the program.
